After a thorough and careful study of the item submitted to me for authentication as EGYPT, 1879 (1st January), 21/2 piastre violet (of October, 1874), with watermark inverted (Zeheri type IV), perforated 121/2, with bilingual "PARAS / 10/ 300 45" surcharge lithographed in black, a mint block of four stamps from the northwest corner of the sheet, with ornamental margins at top and left-hand edges, its northwest stamp

From a provisional printing of the surcharge, by stone lithography, onto 170,000 examples (850 sheets, each of 200 subjects) of the 21/2 plastre stamp of 1874, this submitted

block is from positions #1-2 over 11-12 of the sheet. Printed in a medium shade of color, it shows on its northwest stamp an unobscured portion of the extremely important, constant plate flaw — the "Cleft Pyramid" occurring on the basic stamp of position #1 of every 21/2 plastre sheet. When the "10 PARAS" surcharge, is correctly positioned on the stamp, the cleft is always thoroughly masked by the figure "10". The variety (or a portion thereof) may be seen only when the surcharge is improperly registered, misplaced to the left. Therefore any stamp with "Cleft Pyramid" completely unobscured by the surcharge is a remarkable rarity, of which few examples can exist. The surcharges on this block are indeed slightly misplaced leftward, allowing the right-hand edge of the variety to appear. Although it is not completely visible, it is nonetheless scarce, even as a partial image, especially in a



block of this nature, confirming its sheet position. The surcharges are types I (on the left-hand stamps) and II (on the right-hand stamps) of the lithographic transfer matrix — composed of ten types arranged horizontally, repeated twenty times to produce the overprinting stone (ten images in width by twenty images in depth). A surcharge transfer guide mark (\(\) appears in the northwest corner of stamp #1. After the stone had been imaged, such marks were removed from all but eleven of its positions, where it is assumed that they were kept as a guide for proper registration of the overprint. This very scarce block is "post office fresh" and completely free of faults. It has been hinged only in its selvages con

subjects) of the 1874 21/2 plastre stamps, this submitted example, printed in a medium/deep shade of violet, has an inverted surcharge as a result of the entire sheet from which it came having been placed upside down in the overprinting press. It is from the seventh column of the sheet of basic stamps, and has an inverted surcharge intended to fall on a stamp of the fourth column. Its surcharge is type IV of the lithographic transfer matrix — composed of ten types arranged horizontally, repeated twenty times to produce the overprinting stone (ten images in width by twenty images in depth). The exact number of such error sheets is not known, but the very scarce nature of the genuine inverts indicates that they did not occur in great quantities. It should be duly noted that each of the original 21/2 piastre sheets contained one inverted stamp — tête-bêche, the result of a single stereo having been inserted upside down in position #154 of the 200-stereo typographic printing forme. The surcharge therefore appeared inverted on stamps from that position on normally (upright) surcharged sheets. Many, if not most, of such stamps were excised from the sheets, apparently by the postal authorities, but some examples have survived. They should not be confused with error stamps, such as this submitted example, which come from full sheets with inverted surcharge. This stamp, with its compound perforation gauge, is



an example of the scarcest of all of the 1879 inverted surcharge errors. It is fully sound and free of faults, with some mounting adhesive remnants on reverse. It has a small backstamp of "Berger", struck in purple. It is lightly cancelled by a partial strike of a "POSTE EGIZIANE" postmark (Egypt Study Circle type V). dated "- AGO 79". CFH.

From a provisional printing of the stone lithography, onto 170,000 (850 sheets, each of 200 subjects) of

the 1874 21/2 piastre stamps, this example, printed in a medium/deep shade of violet, is completely sound and free of faults. It is from a sheet that was placed incorrectly onto the press for (or perhaps shifted just prior to) overprinting, such that its surcharge was applied in an improper orientation to the stamps — turned clockwise and running downhill at an incline of about ten degrees. This resulted in a major misalignment of all of the 200 surcharges of the lithographic stone, with many impressions crossing both the horizontal and the vertical perforation lines (surcharge à cheval), falling onto one or more stamps at a time. Because of the extreme nature of the misplacement, some stamps received only a fragmentary surcharge. while others (a column of eight stamps from the southeast corner of the sheet) remained entirely without any surcharge. This submitted stamp is from position #106 (showing a constant positional flaw - broken bottom frameline at southeast corner) of the basic sheet, and bears portions of surcharges intended to fall on stamps #106 and #107 (types VI and VII, respectively. of the lithographic transfer matrix - composed of ten types arranged horizontally, repeated twenty times to image the over-

printing stone). No examples of this variety are known to have been postally used. The defective sheet was apparently a legitimate printing error which, originally culled for destruction, was instead preserved and eventually reached philatelic hands. Genuine examples of this variety are extremely scarce, and it should be noted that excellent forgeries are in circulation can

From a provisional printing of the surcharge, by stone lithography, onto 170,000 (850 sheets, each of 200 subjects) of the 1874 2½ piastre stamps, this block represents positions #61-62-63 over #71-72-73 of the sheet. Its surcharges are of types I (left-hand pair), II (central pair) and III (right-hand pair) of the lithographic transfer matrix — composed of ten types arranged horizontally, repeated twenty times to produce the overprinting stone. Although the vertical perforations at its left-hand and right-hand outer edges are normal, those of the two internal rows are doubled. It is from a sheet on which at least two of the eleven required strikes of the vertical perforation line were performed twice, leaving the twenty stamps of the second column with doubled perforations at their left-hand and right-hand edges. Although the fragile nature of its doubly struck



perforations has necessitated some affixing of hinge fragments for preventive reinforcement, all of the stamps of this block are quite fresh and are fully sound. As is sometimes the case with this issue, the block has its surcharges misplaced slightly upward, with their side-panel "PARAS" and "inscriptions crossing the horizontal perforation lines. A tiny fragment of each stamp's surcharge is therefore á cheval, falling onto the body of the stamp above tr.

From a provisional printing of the surcharge, by stone lithography, onto 170,000 examples (850 sheets. each of 200 subjects) of the 21/2 plastre stamp of 1874, this submitted example, printed in a medium/deep shade of color (with a near-invisible, filled thin at its bottom edge), is from a basic sheet (ten stamps in width by twenty stamps in depth) onto which all 200 images of the lithographic surcharging stone were applied in improper registration. The sheet's incorrect placement in the press during the overprinting operation resulted in its surcharges being uniformly shifted upward a distance of nearly 10mm, such that their images crossed the horizontal perforations of each stamp (surcharge à cheval). This had the rather striking visual effect of splitting each surcharge image nearly in half, with the top 190 stamps of the sheet (rows #1-19) showing portions of two different surcharge images, and the bottom 10 stamps (row #20) showing only the lower portion of a single surcharge image printed at their top edges. Additionally, the ornamental selvage at the top edge of the sheet received the upper portions of ten surcharge images along its width. This stamp is from the only recorded sheet of this variety. No stamp from this distinctive sheet is known postally used, but an unknown quantity (apparently the majority) of them have been "cancelled" by the well-known forged "POSTE EGIZIANE ♦ CAIRO ♦ / 1 GEN 79" circular datestamp (with a characteristic break in the ring, beneath the "C" of "CAIRO"). Uncancelled examples of this surcharge variety are quite rare. C.F.H.
